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What's On in 2019 New Welsh Networks and Festivals Create Opportunities for Film Audiences in Wales

Film Hub Wales (FHW), led by Chapter and part of the part of the BFI Film Audience Network, has announced support for 10 new projects. Thanks to National Lottery funding they will bring more films, to more people, at more cinemas and film festivals across Wales.

Alongside film festivals celebrating animation, Italian cinema and LGBT+ stories, two inventive, new networks will offer accessible events for underserved Welsh audiences:

- The **Youth Film Festival Network** is set to support young film enthusiasts by encouraging regular film programming for audiences aged 16-30. Based in Rhyl with Wicked Wales, it will enable new talent to connect with over 40 film festivals here in Wales
- Working across the Vale of Glamorgan, **Vale Venues**, led by the Memo Arts in Barry, brings 11 cinemas together county wide to reduce community isolation and build sustainable rural film programmes

Hana Lewis, Strategic Manager or Film Hub Wales explains:

"We've learnt so much from the development of our existing Hub networks; Off Y Grid and The Queer Film Network, where members tested pioneering approaches. The ability to come together within a region or specialism brings many benefits, from skills development, to greater choice and representation for audiences. We anticipate that these new networks, with their focus on rural and young audiences, will enable Welsh exhibitors to connect with new cinema goers and impact on what is already an impressive Welsh festival calendar."

Ben Luxford, **Head of UK Audiences**, said: "It's so great to see Film Hub Wales using National Lottery funding to connect and inspire venues and strengthening networks across the whole of Wales for the benefit of audiences."

FHW have brought a total of 29, new, eclectic film exhibition initiatives to Wales in 2019 in partnership with Hub members. The projects are supported by Film Hub Wales, part of the BFI Film Audience Network using funds from the National Lottery to ensure the greatest choice of cinema is available to everyone across the UK.

2019 Projects

Region: Wales Wide

Youth Film Festival Network (August 2019 – March 2020)

A new Welsh film festival network initiative, developed by Film Hub Wales, Wicked Wales (Rhyl) and key festivals within the region will work to increase British independent and international film programmes available for and made by young audiences. With over 40 film festivals active in Wales, this project will bring organisations together to find ways to engage with young film enthusiasts aged 16-30.

WOW Festival

(Sept 2019 - March 2020)

The mission of WOW "Wales One World" Film Festival is to promote solidarity, equality, understanding and dialogue, with global brothers and sisters and diverse communities here in Wales, reflecting a wide range of cultural perspectives. They offer a wide variety of films and events that represent diverse cultures and identities on and off screen, as well as addressing current global themes.

In the theme of Nomads, WOW Film Festival 2020 will bring international cinema to diverse audiences across rural and urban Wales. With a range of talks, panel discussions and introductions, the festival brings films outside of UK distribution to Wales. Special events include WOW Women's Film Club in Newport and Swansea and the return of Abercon, a mini anime convention co-programmed with Mencap Ceredigion at Aberystwyth Arts Centre.

Region: North East Wales

Wicked Wales

(Sept 2019 - March 2020)

Wicked Wales are developing a year-round film programme in Rhyl, raising awareness of their annual Wicked festival in October 2019. Their programme appeals to all ages from 'sing along cinema' for audiences living with dementia, to short international films from 20 countries worldwide, which they deliver in partnership with the <u>European Youth Cinema Network</u> and <u>Into Film</u> <u>Cymru.</u> The project is supported by a team of young volunteers, including a ten week work placement for one young person with additional needs.

Iris on the Move (Jan 2020)

Iris Prize will travel to North Wales for the fourth time in 2020, bringing LGBT+ cinema to venues such as Cineworld Llandudno Junction, Pontio in Bangor and Oriel Mostyn.

The programme will include two new LGBT+ feature films and five programmes of shorts programmes from the Best of Iris 2019, the shortlist competing for the Iris Prize and the Iris Prize Best British Awards in 2019. Audiences in North Wales communities will be able to engage with emerging filmmakers through Q&As and networking. The programme is also set to tour across the UK following the festival.

Region: South East Wales

Vale Venues (Sept 2019-Dec 2020)

<u>Vale Venues</u> is a rural, county-wide project led by the Memo Arts Centre in Barry on behalf of 11 mixed arts venues and community cinemas across the Vale of Glamorgan. In 2019, the network coordinator will develop audience strategies to encourage inclusive and accessible programming across the different sites. Through curated monthly screenings, they will foster collaboration between partners and generate greater public awareness of local cinema screenings and film events in each venue.

Bedwas Arts Festival

(26th October – 4th November 2019)

Bedwas Workmens' Hall hosts a community arts festival, emphasising hands on participation in animation, dance, singing workshops and events; industrial and political history in illustrated talks and a heritage walk; and an evening to raise money for Ray's Lift Appeal, to make the Hall fully accessible for all. This is a pilot project which they hope to make an annual event.

Film activity includes Ms Rhymney Valley' (with Dir. Karl Francis, in conversation with Writer/Director Wyndham Price), screening/talk of 'Voices from a Mountain' and archive footage of Bedwas including 'Bedwas life' (1950's-90's) created by David Rhys James.
